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A MESSAGE FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Dear Friends,

This past fiscal year has been one of the most challenging for me and the Treatment Trends staff. The suspension of services at Allentown Residential, was among the biggest challenges TTI has faced in over 50 years of service. Laying off staff, both program and administrative, coupled with the loss to the community, created a very difficult time for everyone involved.

In September 2024, Treatment Trends hosted a luncheon to honor those in recovery. We were able to spotlight our dedicated staff who help so many people to find and maintain their recovery. We are thankful to our sponsors and our partners in the community who attended our event. Fortunately, at our event, we announced TTI was able to obtain a grant from Lehigh County, passing through opioid settlement funds, to renovate and reopen this program. Many thanks to Lehigh County Department of Drug and Alcohol, the Lehigh County District Attorney's Office and the Pennsylvania Department of Drug and Alcohol Programs for making this happen. The nationwide opioid settlement highlighted a universal crisis in the marketing and dispensing of opioids, and Treatment Trends is proud to be able to utilize these proceeds to renovate both the building and the programming of Allentown Residential so we can continue providing this crucial level of care.

The renovation and redesign of the program has been a challenge in and of itself, as we worked toward reopening in the fall of 2025. In the words of Chelsea Edmunds, the new Facility Director for Allentown Residential, "Today, when we walk through our doors, we see more than renovations, we see a rebirth....This space now reflects our mission: to provide compassionate, person-centered care that restores dignity, promotes recovery, and reminds people they are never alone."

In addition to the construction at Allentown Residential, we have been working on renovating a store front on Main Street in Slatington to house an extension of our outpatient program. A fall opening for this facility is planned, as well. Thanks again, Lehigh County Drug and Alcohol, for providing the funding to make this happen! We look forward to providing assessments and outpatient treatment services to the residents in Slatington and northern Lehigh County.

Although these challenges often felt insurmountable, much like the challenges our clients face on their recovery journey, we are beginning to see that the hard work and perseverance through the tough times brings its own reward. As we enter our second half century of providing treatment services with an improved residential program and a new outpatient treatment facility, we look forward to your continued support and advocacy. Thank you to all of the Treatment Trends staff for the amazing job you do every day, our Board of Directors for your support and guidance, and our community partners who help the individuals we serve to embody our motto: Find Recovery, Heal Community.

I hope you find the information in this report informative and inspiring.








CLIENTS BY GENDER




CLIENTS BY AGE

In June of 2024, operations at Allentown Residential were suspended. Treatment Trends has spent the past year re-evaluating all aspects of the program. Making very mindful changes in furtherance of our vision of a warm, supportive and welcoming environment for those in early recovery.

BEHIND THE SCENES

The decision to close Allentown Residential did not come lightly, and was not a result of one singular event or factor. A shift in focus for more individualized and person-centered care required a significant physical and programmatic change to occur. Thanks to the seeds planted by our Executive Director with DDAP representatives, and support from local DA at the time, who thought of Allentown Residential as a worthwhile project for utilization of funds acquired from the Opioid Settlement Fund. \$1,000,000 of unutilized money was granted to Treatment Trends for this project, and to this day we continue to put it to good use to make improvements to support our community.

WHAT WE TOOK AWAY

The metal detectors at the entrance no longer represented what we wanted for our therapeutic environment. We separated the overcrowded bedrooms, making them smaller, going from 95 beds to 48. We aimed to provide a safe and comfortable living environment for anyone who chooses to begin their recovery journey at Allentown Residential.

WHAT WE ADDED

First and foremost, the focus of this project was to develop a warm and welcoming environment. One of the things we did was add a chair lift, enabling us to welcome individuals seeking recovery who have physical difficulties that would inhibit their ability to navigate our 5 story building. While we would love to have a more significant outdoor space, there is certainly room to grow.

ALLENTOWN HALFWAY HOME

Our 3.1 ASAM Level of Care program provides a safe, secure environment where residents can develop recovery skills, receive support from others & prepare for transition into the community. Located in the heart of Allentown, this facility offers access to public transportation, numerous employers and diverse recovery opportunities.








Financial Self Sufficiency



tti ALLENTOWN RECOVERY HOUSE

Allentown Recovery House is fully licensed by the PA Department of Drug & Alcohol Programs. It is an 11-bed, sober living space for adult males. We provide individuals the opportunity to reside in a safe environment at a low cost, while actively engaging in the recovery community.

tti TREATMENT ALTERNATIVE PROGRAMS

Lehigh County Drug Treatment Court is a non-adversarial alternative to the traditional methods utilized in addressing participants who are struggling with substance use disorders. TTI staff, including a Case Manager and the Drug Court Coordinator, serve on the multi-disciplinary Drug Treatment Court Team, under the direction of Judge Tom Caffrey.

Lehigh County Treatment Continuum Alternative Program (TCAP) gives eligible non-violent offenders the possibility of diversion from jail to treatment. It requires individuals to make a significant commitment to treatment and is supported by a regimen of accountability and management aimed at public safety. TTI contracts with Lehigh County to provide case management for individuals throughout their treatment in TTI and other Lehigh County programs.

Northampton County Treatment Continuum Alternative to Prison (TCAP) is a diversionary program that addresses an individual's criminal violations or charges proactively. They've provided the tools, structure and support, which are necessary to build a successful life in recovery. TTI works with

Northampton County to provide case management and support services for individuals throughout their treatment with TTI programs and centers.

TTI RECOVERY CENTERS

TTI proudly operates three Recovery Centers dedicated to inspiring hope and empowering individuals on their journey to recovery. In a safe, welcoming, and supportive environment, our centers foster meaningful connections and personal growth. Funded by the Northampton County Drug & Alcohol Division, our Recovery Centers provide those seeking and maintaining recovery the tools, resources, and community support needed to rebuild a purposeful, fulfilling life, free from stigma and full of possibility.

Bethlehem Hope Center, Palmer Recovery Center & Northampton Change on Main's dedicated staff serve the community in an essential capacity. Our centers are home to programs such as: Combating Addiction through Connections & Healing (CATCH), Housing Emergency Response to Opioid & Stimulant Use Disorder (HERO), and Treatment Continuum Alternative to Prison (TCAP). Each center is a welcoming hub for anyone seeking information, support, or direct connections to treatment. Through valued community partnerships, we offer a vibrant array of educational and social sober events. By empowering the community, fostering hope, and strengthening resilience, the people we serve can find their individual pathway to recovery.



Bethlehem Hope Center

hosts a variety of weekly recovery meetings, including AA, NA, Young Person AA, MARA, and Recovery Dharma. In addition, the center provides sober social events and offers free haircuts once a month.

Each month, more than 300 individuals participate in center activities, with over 70 people receiving referrals to treatment.

Staff, along with community partners, conduct regular outreach to the unhoused population and encampments. We foster community engagement to address needs and share hope by providing social support, free hygiene packets and recovery resources. Hope Center also conducts free drug and alcohol assessments for Northampton County residents. Our Certified Recovery Specialist (CRS) staff assist clients in meeting their recovery goals by utilizing the Phases of Recovery.



Palmer Recovery Center

hosts 12-Step, Al-Anon, SLAA, and OA meetings. Women's and Men's groups are held weekly. **Each month we serve over 150 individuals.**

Staff conduct outreach with the St. Luke's 4th-year medical students, providing hygiene packets and recovery resources to the unhoused. Special services are provided for Veterans monthly along with Yoga and free haircuts.



Northampton Change on Main

provides a variety of recovery support options, including: 12-Step, Recovery Dharma, and SMART Recovery meetings. The Center also hosts special groups and activities such as Life Healing Choices for women, movie nights, and monthly karaoke. **Each month we served over 200 individuals.**

Staff have built a strong relationship with local police, the borough council, food banks, and local churches. We provide outreach services to the unhoused, offering recovery resources and supports. Change on Main is a safe space to heal and grow with others in the community.



September 2024 The Center officially closed its doors. TTI salutes The Center's dedicated, talented and passionate staff for building and maintaining solid working relationships with a host of partners to help heal community.




